Dear Student.

A feature of all new universities is the lack of established ways of going about things. In Essex in particular this is seen as an opportunity to experiment with new ideas over the whole range of university activities. But in order to learn from these experiments it is not enought to know merely that people react to them in various ways. Many of the important questions concern who it is who react in these ways. So often the obvious point that different people respond differently to the same situation cannot be followed up in any systematic way because very little is known about them. Changes are then made in terms of majorities rather than the differing needs of different people.

As a beginning to learning more about Essex students we are asking you to fill in this questionnaire. Some of the information we ask for is needed for the university's administration or for certain standard statistics which universities have to supply to the U.G.C.; the rest are needed for educational research, though their purpose may not be immediately obvious to you. Some of these questions have already been put to students at other universities, in America or Britain, and so we hope to get comparable results.

We should like you to hand the questionnaire back before the end of term, either to the porter, or to Miss Eaton of the Unit for Research into Higher Education in Hut 5. (We have not sealed the envelopes in which the questionnaire are sent out, so that they can be re-used). If there are any questions which you cannot answer until you have been home, please make a note of them and return the questionnaire with blanks. In that case, we should be grateful if you would let us have the missing information early next term.

This is in many ways a pilot study, and we intend to revise the questionnaire before it is given to the new students next October. Any comments or criticisms you may care to make, either in writing or by calling at Hut 5, will therefore be especially useful to us. We should also be glad to explain any point that is not clear.

We got a very high response rate from your generation, which has made the results especially valuable. They have been of considerable use to us in our researches, some of which have, in their turn, been of value to the University. For example, our study of the Rayleigh Tower contributed to the decision to build further student accommodation of a similar kind. A list of articles etc., arising from this research is attached. They are all available in the Library.

To round off part of our study, we are now sending you a further, much shorter, questionnaire. You will see that it repeats some of the attitude questions that we put to you three years ago, and also asks you for your comments on the University. It also touches on certain areas on which you may have been interviewed by Roy Cox, but covers them in a broader way with a more representative sample. Few follow-up studies of this kind have been done in this country, and we believe the results will be valuable, especially as comparable data are being collected in the University of Sussex.

We shall be most grateful if you will complete the questionnaire and put it into one of the boxes provided at the Porters' Desks. As before, your replies will be treated as confidential - nothing will be disclosed in which any individual can be identified. Subject to this confidentiality, any information that may produce a wider understanding of universities and their students will be published.

We are most grateful to you and your fellow students for the help you have given us in the past, and for the further help which we hope you are now about to give us.

### CONFIDENTIALITY AND AMONYMITY

Any collection of data about individuals involves problems of confidentiality, but without such data research on universities would be impossible, and without such research we cannot have the understanding of the effects and effectiveness of changes that makes constructive change possible.

You will see that on this questionnaire we identify each respondent by a code number. Mevertheless, we handle the questionnaire in a manner that ensures their anonymity. The key lies in the use made of the list that links numbers to names. The code number is needed to relate different pieces of data and to discover any bias in response, but means nothing to anyone without the list of names. It will be used only for booking in questionnaires, sending out reminders, and putting other data, such as degree results, onto punched cards. The reading, checking and coding of the questionnaires will be done by my research assistant, who will not have the list available to her at the time.

As an additional safeguard we are ensuring that no tabulations become available that relate to fewer than three people.

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
For those who have been at the University of Essex since 1963-4, the predominant impression is probably one of rapid change. They may be reassured or disappointed depending on their outlook to know that the overwhelming impression gained from statistics about student characteristics, is one of stability. In what follows I have tried to select from a considerable amount of data collected by the former Unit for Research into Higher Education<sup>1</sup>, some figures which seem of particular interest and which are relevant to current issues in Essex and in Britain generally. Most of the results given are derived from questionnaires completed by entering students in each of the years 1964-66 and relate to the following numbers:

These represent response rates of 94, 98 and 87 per cent respectively.

One of the simplest and most basic distinctions to make seemed is to be that between men and women.

The overall figure for British universities in 1964/65 was 30 per cent women and it therefore appears that Essex is moving closer to the national The increase in the proportion of women in 1965 is almost certainly due to the introduction of Comparative Studies in that year. I had thought at first that variations in the Essex figures could be mostly explained by such changes in the subjects available at Essex, and the balance between them (nationally there are fewer women in science and maths, than in social studies and arts). It was the discovery that in 1967 the proportion of women had dropped by seven per cent while the proportion taking science or maths. had only increased by two per cent which made me look further. I discovered that in Social Studies more surprisingly in Comparative Studies, men are increasing their stake. In 1964 more than 50 per cent of entrants to Social Studies were women by 1967 the fiture had dropped to 30 per cent. In 1965 almost 69 per cent of students entering Comparative Studies were women, this year the figure is only 52 per cent.

You will remember that the Robbins Report drew attention to the large differences between men and women in the use made of facilities for higher Given that the vast majority of research available suggests little difference in "innate" abilities, the Robbins committee concluded that a large part of the untapped or underdeveloped talent must be found It is therefore interesting that the percentage of women among girls. admitted to university institutions in England and Wales has stayed almost constant at about 28 per cent from 1961-1966 in spite of the inclusion in 1965 and 1966 of the technological universities which provide many more opportunities for men. Either more women are going into science and technology or women are having more success in non-technological subjects and/or New universities have attracted more than their share of universities. In 1965 women made up 44.6 per cent of the intake of the six new universities compared with an average of 30.1 per cent at older nontechnical universities in England and Wales. By 1966 this figure had dropped to 40 per cent. At Essex this decline has continued into 1967 and figures

#### Age on entry

The Essex figures for age on entry have varied a little over the years, the largest deviation from the average being that there were very few mature students (aged 20 and over) among 1964 entrants. again to be a tendency for Essex figures to approach the national average. Perhaps the most interesting distinction to be made is between students entering different schools of study. The Robbins Committee found that students in social studies (and applied sciences) were most likely to This is the at trick have had an interval between school and university. Among 1965 entrants only 15 per cent of Physical Scientists had had a gap compared with 35 per cent in Maths. studies, 59 per cent in Social Studies and 62 per cent in Comparative Studies. All kinds of factors influence this result, e.g. in some courses intending students may benefit from a break whereas in others, this may not be so. Some entrance requirements are easier for mature students to meet. Whatever the causes the fact itself is important There are indications from several research for at least two reasons. reports that the subject studied may be a key variable in analysing and interpreting some observed differences between undergraduate students. If, however, there is a consistent tendency for physical scientists to be younger and less experienced than other students, this must be taken into account before reaching conclusions about the influence of the subject of Secondly the fact that physical science entrants tend to be younger study. may cast some light on the criticisms sometimes voiced about university science departments, e.g. that they are too much like school in their approach to both subject and students. 



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
